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TECHQUITY AWARD

VLRC was honoured with the HLTH Foundation's Global Techquity Impact Award for our pioneering efforts in leveraging artificial intelligence technology to enhance access to visionsaving diabetic retinopathy screening for Canadians. This prestigious award recognizes our commitment to overcoming geographical, cultural, and socioeconomic barriers faced by populations with persistent health disparities.



COMMUNITY **PARTNER AWARD**

In July 2023, we presented the first VLRC Distinguished Community Partner Award to the Ophthalmology Department of Kingston Health Sciences Centre (KHSC) in Kingston, Ontario. This plan includes empowering staff and the Champions Network to provide feedback, implementing an Inclusion, Diversity, Equity & Accessibility (IDEA) toolkit, and offering targeted training and awareness programs.

Summer Intervention Program Testimonials


Veronica and Rhea are two girls with unique stories about the impact of VLRC's Summer Intervention Program in Newfoundland. This program provides tailored support and compassionate guidance to those navigating visual impairments. Despite their age differences, Veronica and Rhea share a common thread: the transformative influence of dedicated intervenors and individualized approaches.

Veronica, at just 2 1/2 years old, faces daily challenges due to congenital cataracts. However, with the help of the program's interventions, she has found happiness and progress, which has led to her developing independence and confidence. Additionally, the journey of 13-year-old Rhea emphasizes the program's role in nurturing personal growth and skill mastery.

Through these narratives, we witness hope and empowerment emerging from the Summer Intervention Program. Veronica and Rhea's experiences are an example for others who are navigating visual impairment, demonstrating the power of compassion, dedication, and personalized support.

Here are their stories.





Rhea's Story

13-year-old Rhea shares a first-person account of her experience with the program in Newfoundland:

"Spending time with my Intervenor Charlotte was the highlight of my summer! She seemed to understand when I needed a bit of extra help and encouraged me when she saw I was able to be independent! We made such a great connection, and all our time together was fun, even if we were working on some routine tasks.

Tying my own shoes has been a longterm goal. When Charlotte thought of making a board with a lace on it to practice, it made all the difference and I am now tying my shoes like a pro!

Hanging out with Charlotte through the Intervenor Program made my summer complete!"

Rhea's mom, Susan, also has glowing remarks about her daughter's intervenor experience:

"My daughter Rhea has participated in the SIP through VLRC for the last five summers; it has become something she looks forward to each year!

Rhea and her intervenor Charlotte made a summer "Bucket List" and worked their way through it. There were activities like baking, tying shoes, tiedyeing shirts, swimming, shopping, and painting. As always, Rhea enjoyed the one-on-one attention and excelled at tasks she had sometimes struggled with before. Keeping up mobility and tech skills when parents suggest it isn't cool, but add a fun, skilled, and committed teenager, and it rocks! A win-win!"





Veronica's Story

Viktoria and Jonathan, parents of Veronica, shares their experience with the program in Newfoundland:

"The Summer Intervention Program has been a very positive experience for our family. We have been privileged to participate in it for two years in a row.

Our 2 1/2-year-old daughter Veronica was born with a congenital cataract causing blindness in her right eye. She had surgery at four months old to remove the cataract, but is still legally blind in that eye. Veronica's fight for sight includes patching 6-8 hours every day to strengthen the vision in that eye.

As a busy work-from-home mom with a five-yearold son as well, patching has become a daily struggle. Luckily, Veronica has been happy to patch and do visually stimulating activities with her intervenors, which has alleviated a lot of stress for me and the family. [Each year] the intervenors have been wonderful and have helped Veronica become more independent and confident with day-to-day tasks. They've been such a fun distraction that Veronica hardly ripped any patches off during the whole program!

We are so thankful for this program!"


